The Anchorage Police Department requests funding for Gang Unit Suppression Overtime Details. Patrol officers will work overtime details with a mission to gather intelligence on gangs including areas of operation, gang members and crimes they are involved in. These additional details will be used to saturate any area that is showing increased gang activities in an effort to take control of neighborhoods and to make those areas safer for the community due to the increased presence of uniformed patrol officers and increased enforcement activities. Elements of these details will include: field interviews and photos of gang related activities, targeting of gang residences, and garnering support from local landlords to legally evict criminal elements. The ability to maintain a presence in effected neighborhoods will foster citizens' willingness to cooperate with police and assist in problem resolution.

Project Name: Municipality of Anchorage -- Interoperable Public Safety Digital Radios (AWARN/Anchorage Police Department)

Project Location: Anchorage, Alaska

Requested funds will purchase 1 interoperable land mobile portable radio and 1 interoperable land mobile vehicle mounted (mobile) radio for each sworn officer of the Anchorage Police Department (APD) as well as mobiles for special operation vehicles and portables for the Police Search and Rescue Auxiliary. Funds will modify and upgrade the existing APD dispatch center communications console to comply with the APCO Project 25 standard and permit operation on the AWARN zone of the combined State of Alaska/US Department of Defense Alaska Land Mobile Radio (ALMR) system. To date, the MOA has invested \$9.1 million in federal grants, state grants and municipal bonds in this project, which is almost 50% complete. AWARN is compatible with, and a backup system to, the ALMR system. This partnership provides equipment and greatly reduces risk of system failure for ALMR/AWARN during disaster. When ALMR and AWARN are in place, 85% of the first responders in AK will have the capacity for instant, seamless, interoperable radio communication during disasters. AK will almost certainly be the first state the nation to achieve this level of interoperability.

Most are included in the "Connect Anchorage Initiative" jointly signed by Governor Murkowski and Mayor Begich in the fall of 2006. Funding will allow the construction of priority projects to be accelerated providing immediate benefit to the Anchorage economy.

The existing DHHS facility, which was first built in 1960 as a three-story hospital expanded to five floors, is currently used to house the majority of the Municipality of Anchorage's Health and Human Services Department. It continues to serve the residents of Anchorage as a major health care clinic. In order to continue to provide the Anchorage community with essential services that address and guard against public health and safety issues, it is necessary to develop a new facility. Federal funding is requested for design, engineering, renovation and expansion of an existing building for conversion into a public health facility.

All of the existing building's mechanical systems have reached or are reaching their reasonable design life-expectancy. Galvanized steel water lines are failing and are being repaired as needed. The heating and ventilation system was originally designed for three floors, and was expanded to five, which causes heating and cooling deficiencies within the building. The boilers and distribution system are antiquated.

Additionally, non-friable (not able to disperse to the air) asbestos materials are still present in the facility.

An existing site and facility that is owned by the United States Postal Service has been identified by the MOA as a viable location for a "new" facility to house the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). The new site offers a unique opportunity to create a "campus" setting with the Loussac Library, Cuddy Family Midtown Park, and Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center (ANHC) at a centralized midtown location.

The existing 32,500 sq ft. post office space will be converted to provide a one-stop, single point of entry for consumers seeking an array of health and human services. An additional 30,000 sq ft of additional office space will be added to the existing site to provide for a total of 62,500 sq ft facility that will more effectively meet the needs of the community.

In addition to this specific facility project, planning has involved working with ANHC (as a private entity) to develop a comprehensive community health center facility that can expand access to primary health care services for citizens across the community. This facility will be developed concurrently, and co-located with the DHHS site, and will complement the array of services and resources that would be provided to the community.

Federal funding would specifically be used for design, engineering, renovation and expansion of the existing USPS site.

HRSA plays a vital role in funding services and facilities that promote accessible health care for local communities. Funding for a facility of this nature will require a partnership between local government, private entities, and the support of federal funding to be successful.

Regarding local matches, the MOA is working with the USPS on a land exchange/purchase to acquire the site identified for development. The estimated value of the existing land and facility identified for renovation is \$14,000,000, which would be attributed to local match to assist with funding for the project. In addition, the value of the property that is home for the current DHHS building (825 L Street, Anchorage) will be used to offset the overall project costs associated with the USPS land exchange/purchase. This real estate value will be used as a source of local match.

Funds requested will support the MOA's Interpersonal Violence Program (IVP), which coordinates with the community to implement prevention and intervention strategies associated with sexual assault, domestic violence, child/elder abuse and neglect, and youth and gang violence. Interpersonal violence is a significant public safety and health and human service issue, as well as an economic issue that affects our community. Alaska's rate of child abuse is 4.5 times greater than the national average, and the rate of rape is almost 1.5 times greater than the national average. The Anchorage Police Department responds to an average of 3,600 reported domestic violence cases each year.

Building Healthy Family and Personal Relationship Projects will use federal funding for distribution of "positive parenting" booklets that support healthy child and parent relationships. Parents' interactions with each other and their children are directly related to whether or not a child will be prone to violent behavior in later years. In addition, developing healthy interpersonal relations can decrease the incidence of teen dating violence, youth gang violence, and sexual assault and abuse committed by youth against other children. Funding will also be used to further assess the prevalence of sexual assault and stalking in Anchorage, to develop appropriate intervention strategies and response systems.

The Anchorage Domestic Violence Prevention Project (ADVPP) - This funding request will be used to continue one of the most successful intervention strategies undertaken in Alaska. The ADVPP is a partnership between DHHS, Anchorage Police Department, Municipal Department of Law (Prosecution), Information and Technology Department, the State Department of Public Safety, and Abused Women's Aid in Crisis (local domestic violence shelter). This project provides timely information related to offender bail and judgment findings to investigative and patrol officers. This project has increased offender accountability and victim safety. The project also provides emergency financial assistance to victims and their children for medical care, transportation and safe shelter.

Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA), and VAWA provide for federal assistance to local communities to address the epidemic of interpersonal violence in this country. Alaska has led the nation in rate of rape for over 26 years, and reported child abuse and neglect is the highest in the nation. The Municipality of Anchorage seeks federal funds to respond to these high rates.

In partnership with Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADFG) and the private sector, the Municipality of Anchorage will construct a salmon and fishery education and information center adjacent to the ADF&G's new hatchery facility along Ship Creek in Anchorage. The Center's mission is to sustain healthy salmon populations and aquatic resources in Southcentral Alaska through excellence in education and delivery of scientifically sound information. Educational exhibits proposed for the Center include: interactive interpretive kiosks, multipurpose aquatic resource learning and training centers, salmon viewing, and more. The facility will support Alaska Department of Fish & Game's Salmon in the Classroom program, the MOA's Salmon in the City initiative and other regional salmon recovery partnerships. Programs will connect with private sector tourism, and convention and visitor business activities. The facility will be made available to community groups and educational organizations.

The Ship Creek Salmon Learning Center offers an unparalleled opportunity to nourish a growing appetite for knowledge-based visitor experiences and stimulate economic development along Ship Creek. This facility will appeal to all Alaska residents who care deeply about our cultural traditions, salmon and other fisheries and aquatic resources. The Center's multiple objectives include: 1) build a life-long appreciation, understanding, and stewardship of aquatic resources in Southcentral Alaska; 2) reinforce the economic benefits of a robust sport fishery in Southcentral Alaska; 3) Promote Ship Creek as recreational fishing and educational destination; 4) ensure school, community, visitor access and use of the facility; 5) support mission of ADF&G's Sport Fishing Division and Hatchery Program; and 6) support regional salmon restoration efforts.

Ship Creek is home to one of the most popular urban sport fisheries in Alaska – providing the Municipality of Anchorage and the State of Alaska with tremendous economic and quality of life benefits. The Salmon Learning Center provides the opportunity to showcase: a Unique Ship Creek Salmon Fishery; the economic, cultural and social significance of healthy aquatic resources a vibrant; and sustainable fishery management in Alaska. Alaskans care deeply about salmon and aquatic resources and depend on these resources for food, jobs, and recreation. Recreational fishing in Alaska supports approximately 9000 Alaska jobs and generates about \$230 million in annual income (ISER). The Ship Creek salmon fishery regularly attracts thousands of local residents and visitors- providing an annual economic benefit of approximately \$7.3million (ADF&G).

We have inadequate facilities and limited capacity to meet public demand for information: The existing hatchery facility in Anchorage attracts up to 60,000 visitors on an annual basis and does not provide a compelling visitor experience. The existing information and educational facilities cannot accommodate current visitations and cannot take advantage of a much larger expected visitor market of 120,000 people. There are no facilities in Southcentral Alaska focused exclusively on Alaska's recreational fisheries. Although ADF&G sport fish division delivers several statewide education programs, its programs are constrained by the lack of dedicated space for presentations, education programs and interpretation.

The Center is a strategic investment and venue for sustaining and restoring salmon populations. The Salmon Learning Center is an effective tool to both inform and to inspire public and private sector investment in salmon recovery and stewardship efforts in Alaska and the Nation. Since 1991, the National Marine Fisheries Service has listed 26 Evolutionarily Significant Units of Pacific salmon as either threatened or endangered under the Endangered Species Act. The geographic area covered by the listings roughly equivalent to the area of the State of California. The listings affect the entire West coast of the United States. Salmon recovery is an Alaska and a national issue affecting the state's and the nation's economy, jobs and tourism, Alaska native subsistence, and the health of aquatic resources. The Learning Center is part of a comprehensive strategy to ensure the sustainability of Alaska salmon and to build partnerships to restore salmon habitat. It will have the ability to serve the needs of salmon and fisheries restoration programs throughout Southcentral

Requested funding will build upon a 2007 effort to educate residents about Meth through TV and radio ads, print media, and peer to peer educational efforts. Funding will help work underway to develop a tool kit containing literature and DVDs for meth awareness for free distribution to all communities in AK. Funding will also help implement plans to develop an in-school program that can be used in all school districts across the state. Funding will also support plans to sponsor a state-wide meth summit to bring all interested parties together to talk, evaluate, and plan better approaches. AME currently maintains a web site, www.AlaskaMethEd.com to provide information on meth issues. AME has committed with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Alaska to support a meth program in development. Meth is such an addictive drug that our slogan "Never a First Time" must be instilled in our young Alaskans to keep them from trying this dangerous drug.

Methamphetamine is one drug Alaskans do not want in our communities. Meth use is especially attractive – and especially dangerous - to young Alaskans. Meth use and production is on the rise in Alaska. According to the Department of Public Safety, meth production arrests have doubled and distribution arrests have quadrupled since 2001. The 2003 Youth Risk Behavior Survey found that 6.7% of 9th graders, 8.0% of 12th graders, and 6% of Alaskan high school students had used meth at least once. In 2004, 66 meth labs were busted in Alaska.

Accomplishments

In April 2006, the Tri-Borough Commission composed of the mayors of the Municipality of Anchorage and Mat-Su and Kenai Peninsula Boroughs launched the Alaska Meth Education project. The project includes television and radio advertisements, print media, peer to peer educational efforts, an in-school program that can be used in all school districts across the state and a tool kit for meth awareness which can be distributed to all communities in Alaska free of charge.

A statewide strategic plan, including a media campaign consisting of TV, radio and print ads, has been underway. A task force, consisting of two representatives from each of the five communities, has been formed to advise and monitor the program.

A statewide inventory was completed in October 2006 to find out what meth education and prevention programs are available in Alaska so the project wouldn't duplicate efforts. Research on the best practices in meth prevention and education has been on-going since April 2006.

Two very successful day long summits were offered to the community to share information on prevention and treatment of meth; hundreds of people attended.

The project is especially grateful to Alaska's congressional delegation for securing \$383,000 in federal Fiscal '08 for this project. Funding sought for Fiscal '09 will continue and expand the program.

Funding Needed

Funding has been raised from state and local government and private sources, and more fund-raising is underway. In 2006, the Alaska Legislature appropriated \$100,000 for meth education, half of which went to this program. Local government funds are being donated, along with private sector contributions.

Covenant House Alaska has been providing a "lifeline from the streets" for homeless and runaway youth in Anchorage since 1988. Covenant House, located in downtown Anchorage, serves about 3,000 young people through its residential, drop-in, and outreach programs. Covenant House provides emergency shelter and counseling, as well as a transitional housing program, assistance in completing a GED and finding employment, health services, and a mentoring programs. Funds would allow Covenant House to expand programming and serve a much higher percentage of MOA youth that are homeless with a new 37,000 square foot facility. The new facility would allow space to adequately meet their needs, with a separate intake room, private space for families, counseling offices, and increased programming space. The new facility would also allow Covenant House to consolidate its administrative offices with its programming and housing space, allowing more staff to interact and monitor the youth.

An estimated 3,000 to 5,000 Anchorage youth under the age of 20 are homeless, according to the Anchorage School District and the Anchorage Police Department. Young people living in Anchorage are at high risk of being victimized, face particularly harsh conditions in the winter, and are severely hindered in their efforts to finish school. In the last three years our Crisis Center experienced a 58% increase in our average daily census. Our program is sorely in need of additional space if we are going to continue to meet the needs of youth in Alaska. Without a new facility, the current level of service, which the entire state benefits from, will be decreased due to a lack of adequate space. In Fiscal Year 2007, 3,165 youth received services at Covenant House.

This new facility will have more beds, a separate intake room, private space for families, counseling offices, increased services through our health clinic and increased programming space. The relocation of the facility will enhance Covenant House's capacity to meet a critical State need: providing effective housing and social service solutions for homeless and runaway youth; services which in turn lessen Alaska's rate of youth violence, gang activity, drug and alcohol abuse, incarceration, and school drop out.

Community Service Patrol and Transfer Station - The Municipality is requesting funding to support the city's emergency medical services for chronic public inebriates provided by the Community Service Patrol (CSP) and the Transfer Station. The CSP provides van service to transport incapacitated individuals found in public locations (streets, sidewalks, parks) to a safe, secure location known as the Transfer Station. The Transfer Stations allows individuals to "sleep off" their intoxication in an environment that offers emergency medical first aid and transport to local hospitals. Over the last three years, there has been 24% increase in CSP transports and/or Transfer Station admissions. A University of Alaska study predicts utilization in 2010 will equal over 30,000 user/visits per year, three times that of 2003 numbers.

Case Management Services - The Municipality of Anchorage, Department of Health and Human Services is proposing to expand the city's comprehensive system of care for chronic public inebriates based on a three tiered intervention strategy delivered through the Pathways to Sobriety Program. Pathways I targeted chronic public inebriates who engaged "voluntarily" with case management services. Pathways II focused on individuals with a "mental health disorder", who could not reasonably make decisions in their best interests. Pathways III's primary focus will be on individuals who suffer from severe psychosis, organic brain damage, or other medical conditions that compromises their health and their ability to access needed mental or medical services. Pathways III, in partnership with community agencies, will provide case management services to coordinate access to detoxification, medical and mental health care, treatment, and secure transitional and/or stable housing. The Program will work to implement an "involuntary commitment system" to alleviate the physical harm and reduce the number of fatalities that result from alcohol and/or substance abuse. This system is codified by law; however, the community has lacked the resources to implement a viable system that cares for the community's most vulnerable and medically comprised chronic inebriates. This program is designed to work with the city's homeless and chronic public inebriates through outreach services with the city's initial emergency care system known as the Community Service Patrol and Transfer Station. This program will also work with referrals made by community agencies working with the near-homeless and homeless who otherwise fall through the gaps in services for chronic substance abusers.

Detoxification and Treatment Beds - Due to a reduction of federal funding passed thru the state, there are no longer detoxification beds available to the target population through Pathways to Sobriety. Funding will increase health care for those without medical insurance, or low-incomes for whom the cost for detoxification is prohibitive. Over the next year, lack of detox services will severely impact local emergency hospital rooms, and public safety services. For example, it is estimated that:

- Ø More than 880 individuals will not receive a comprehensive substance abuse assessment with recommendation for appropriate treatment
- Ø 880 individuals will not have access to alcohol and drug education groups while detoxifying.
- Ø Those seeking detoxification in a hospital emergency setting will choose not to stay long enough for effective treatment because all three emergency hospital units in Anchorage are often on diversionary status, which leads to a greater risk of harm for the individuals seeking treatment.
- Ø The target population are at greater risk of death as detoxification and treatment beds are unavailable for the medically comprised and for those suffering from significant mental health disorders.

Municipal DHHS System Staff/Office Supplies - DHHS staff will implement case management services in coordination with the Alaska Coalition on Homelessness, Alaska Housing and Finance Corporation, state agencies such as Public Assistance, local community agencies serving the homeless and near-homeless, and agencies providing alcohol and substance abuse services. Outreach services will also be coordinated at the city's Transfer Station to capture individuals seeking immediate detoxification and treatment.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) promotes community-based substance abuse treatment services for individuals and families who need them. Under 42 CFR, DHHS established prevention and intervention strategies through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Within SAMHSA, the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT) works with states and community-based groups to improve and expand existing substance abuse treatment services under the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant Program. The CSAT also works to develop comprehensive prevention systems to create healthy communities.

Approximately five years ago, Pathways was awarded a SAMSHA grant under a competitive grant process to implement Pathways I. According to the State Attorney General, Alaska has one of the highest rates of addiction and need for persons requiring alcohol treatment. As the state's largest city, the Municipality is in need of federal support to curb this national trend. In addition, the Municipal DHHS works with Southcentral Foundation, which receives Indian Health Service (IHS) funding to support the target population at the Community Service Patrol and Transfer Station. Approximately 86% of persons served by CSP and transported to the Transfer Station are AK Native/American Indian. The IHS goal is to assure that comprehensive, culturally acceptable personal and public health services are available and accessible to American Indian and Alaska Native people.

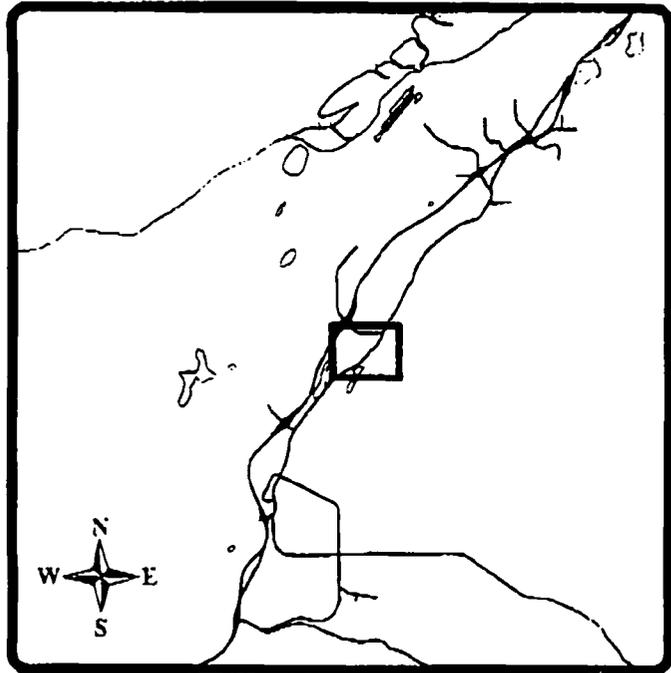
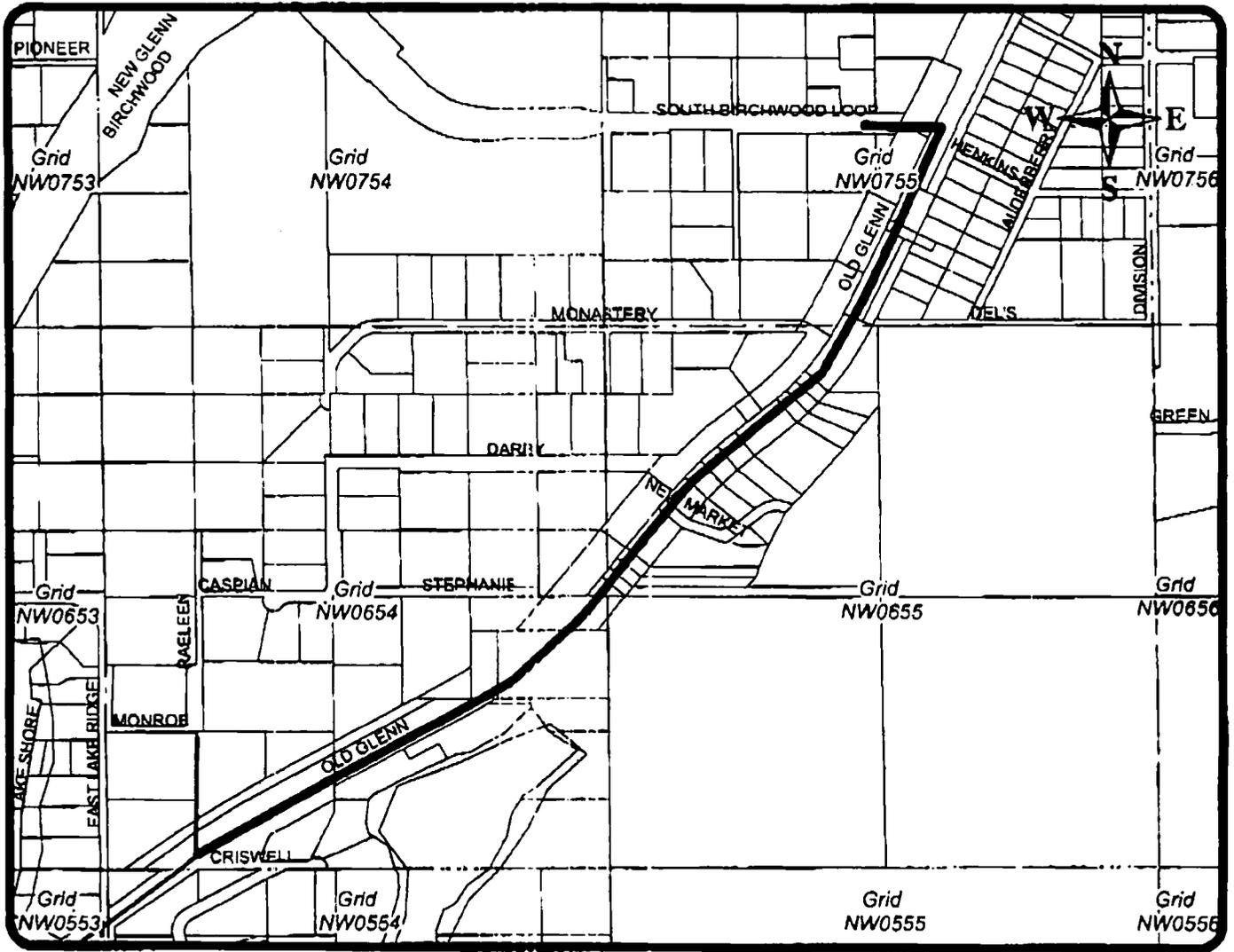

Northern Communities Sewer Extension: The northern portion of the Municipality beyond Eagle River is served entirely by on-site septic systems. This project will provide for the installation of backbone sewer to extend the sanitary sewer system north of Fire Lake. Public wastewater infrastructure will provide public sewer service to Birchwood Elementary School and Chugiak High School, which presently rely upon on-site systems. Construction funding will allow the project to occur in coordination with planned State Road funding for the Old Glenn Highway Upgrade. These funds will also compliment prior voter-approved bond sales for major maintenance funding to secure sewer service for the High School. Sanitary Sewer: Chugiak Schools Trunk (2590 Lft of 8 & 10"), S. Birchwood Interceptor (7510 Lft of 8 & 18")

Public wastewater infrastructure will be a step towards relieving nitrate contamination that is possible given the soil conditions and number of wells in the area, discovered in sections of the northern portion of the Municipality. The areas groundwater aquifer may become contaminated by on-site systems, and in addition, surface water sources that experience run-off from failing septic systems. This project has its environmental review complete, including an Environmental Assessment in conformance with USEPA requirements necessary to secure a FONSI and pre-design is complete.

The Anchorage Regional Landfill (ARL) is the largest and most technologically sophisticated landfill in Alaska. The Municipality of Anchorage recently installed a methane-gas collection system at the ARL. What is currently lacking is the infrastructure to convert the methane to electrical power generation. ARL estimates that the amount of methane available is at least enough to provide electrical generation for 2500 home for over 40 years. While other states have successfully shown landfill methane to electrical generation is feasible, Alaska to date has had no project to demonstrate this technology's effectiveness and advantages. MOA is seeking federal funding to launch Alaska's first landfill methane to electricity project. At successful completion of this project, Anchorage will not only have a new source of electrical generation, we will also be able to apply this technology to other landfills around the state. Waste disposal at landfills is one of the chief environmental concerns listed by local governments throughout the state. It is also one of the key environmental issues being addressed through the EPA Alaska office through IGAP grants.

This new vehicle will enable the Crime Scene Investigation Team to quickly respond to violent crime scenes in a consolidated manner with all necessary equipment on board and ready for deployment. Adequate room will allow forensic investigators to collect, evaluate and prepare evidence for transportation to the department's Forensic crime Laboratory or Property & Evidence Unit. A large meeting/conference area will enable on-scene briefings of the District Attorney, Municipal Prosecutors, department and municipal leadership, patrol division or other applicable detective units. Wireless network connections will enable the on-scene collection of trace fingerprints or other digital based photography that can be forwarded immediately to the Crime Lab for further investigation.

A reliable, all weather deployment capable, vehicle will enable the Crime Scene Investigation Team respond to more than the average fifty (50) scenes investigated with the current vehicle.

The proposed unit will consist of a 38" Travel Supreme Commercial Motor Coach specially designed and manufactured, by the factory, for the specific purpose that it will serve. It will be powered by a 400 horsepower Cummins Diesel engine and six speed Allison automatic transmission to enable travel to any crime scene in the jurisdictional area or served neighboring communities. The main forensic inspection and packaging area will have two slide outs outfitted with professional grade aluminum cabinets, parts bins, storage drawers and closets; two large stainless steel processing tables, one with a deep sink and draining cavity; additional 110volt electrical outlets, excellent forensic lighting sources, large vented super glue booth, transparent curtain to drivers area and sliding pocket doors to separate the kitchenette and conference areas. All interior wall surfaces of the cabin area will be covered with a special easy to clean flexible, non-porous plastic material and transport bus style non-porous rubber floor mat to enable easy mopping/decontamination while retaining traction ability. The conference/meeting area will have a separate outside entry door and room enough to gather six to eight personnel to view evidence and captured video or to discuss critical details of the investigation.

The unit will have two (2) 35,000 btu heating units and two roof mounted central air conditioners that will be capable of maintaining any desired climate in the forensic inspection area. The coach will be equipped with a 12.5 Kw diesel generation system to provide adequate on scene power at any site location with the ability to power outside lighting sources enabling extended processing time capability. The kitchenette area will contain a small refrigerator, microwave, lavatory, sink and small counter area to provide the team with the ability to remain on-scene at extended investigation crime scenes.

Both of these programs increase home owner responsibility to be prepared for emergencies such as wildfire.

Federal funding of \$5 million is requested to leverage a potential \$35 million from State and private sources to jumpstart the Fire Island Wind Power Renewable Energy Project. This request would finance a portion of the cost to build necessary infrastructure to connect the Fire Island wind project to the existing power grid. Funding would go to the Joint Action Agency (JAA) consisting of ML&P, Chugach Electric Association and Golden Valley Electric Association as well as Cook Inlet Region, Inc. The Fire Island Wind Power project is Alaska's best opportunity to see that a significant amount of renewable energy is installed on the Railbelt energy grid. Renewable energy is needed in the Anchorage area to hedge against the rising price of natural gas, which generates 85% of the electricity used between Homer and Fairbanks. The Department of Energy's 2004 study of Cook Inlet gas reserves notes that Southcentral Alaska may soon see a significant natural gas supply crunch. Meanwhile, the cost of that gas is rising steadily. Fire Island wind power would provide the benefit of fixed cost affordable energy to Railbelt utilities for the 25-50 year life of the project.

Total cost to connect Fire Island to the Anchorage power grid are estimated by Chugach Electric Association to be about \$40 million (\$20 million for the intertie and \$20 million for the island infrastructure). A \$5 million federal appropriation in FY09 would help leverage \$20 million from the State in 2008 and the remaining state funding in future years. (The federal appropriation could even be made contingent on securing all the necessary infrastructure money).

Once the intertie and infrastructure costs are covered (\$40 million), it will make economic sense for a third party developer to invest what could be \$175 million for the wind turbines (the project itself), taking advantage of the federal production tax credit. The developer would then sell the power back to the utilities in a long-term power purchase agreement. The more the infrastructure is subsidized, the less the investment by the developer, and the lower the final cost of power for electric consumers in the Municipality.

Wind power is the fastest growing form of energy in the world, in large part because technological improvements have made it cost competitive with conventional generating technologies. As the price of those conventional fuels like gas and coal increase, it is time to begin to harness the excellent wind resources that exist in Cook Inlet.

Fire Island, off the coast of Anchorage, is where the greatest opportunity for renewable energy in the Railbelt, and probably the state, currently exists. The Island is Chugach Electric's best potential site for a large-scale wind farm. The 4000 acre island has the potential for up to 120 MW of generating capacity, assuming the use of large 1.5 to 3.0 MW turbines. A 50-100 megawatt wind power project at Fire Island would displace significant amounts of Cook Inlet natural gas every year. A decreased dependence on natural gas, which is forecasted to continue to increase in price, is perhaps the greatest advantage of a wind farm to a utility. With wind, a utility can project the cost of power fairly accurately over the 20-25 life span of the turbine because there are no fuel costs. This "hedge" against rising fuel prices is a significant motivator for utilities that must attempt to provide the lowest cost power to consumers and is a second major advantage of the project.

Finally, Fire Island represents a way for the Railbelt to invest well into Alaska's energy future. The wind in Cook Inlet is inexhaustible. Although the turbines will need to be replaced in approximately 25 years, engineers believe the towers, which represent about 40% of the price of installing a turbine, will last upwards of 50 years. That means after new turbines are attached to the towers, the power from the wind energy in years 26-50 will be even cheaper than the first 25 years.

Funds will help transition from hard copy files and patient charts to a digital records system. The Anchorage Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is a key provider of basic health services to many families across the Municipality, and in particular, to the population base that is most vulnerable during large-scale disasters. Geographically Anchorage is situated in one of the most seismically active areas in the world, and was devastated by one of the largest measured earthquakes in modern history. In order to ensure continued access to health care records for our clients both on site in a recovery scenario, and to readily transfer information to other remote locations off site in the event of an evacuation, DHHS needs to transition from the current hard copy/paper records environment, to a secure electronic system.

In an effort to better comply with federal HIPAA law disaster contingency plan and recovery requirements and in recognition of the federal priority of moving to EMRs, the Anchorage DHHS has identified the following technology infrastructure items as critical to its ability to recover from a disaster and maintain secure, survivable and reliable storage of electronic medical records:

Scanning and Retrieval System

The transition from the current hard copy records and patient charts to an electronic system requires capturing the existing data via a scanning and indexing process. This phase can be overwhelming initially given the hundreds of thousands of individual items that require conversion; but once completed subsequent record maintenance and all new records are done electronically eliminating a large portion of the hard copy scan requirement. The conversion to "soft copy" also requires the development of index keys and a system to rapidly retrieve based on these keys. DHHS has already installed a data system that provides for creating electronic records for new clients, and to a limited degree can accommodate some conversion of existing hard copy material to augment these new digital client files. What is required to complete this process however is a true Scanning and Retrieval system to complete the transition from the hard copy files and to improve what is currently a rudimentary indexing system. This system would primarily be comprised of software, but would include some high speed/high volume scanning devices.

Secure Cisco Network Switches

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA, Title II), requires that all providers of health care meet national standards for electronic transactions. The security of the network which supports these electronic records is paramount. Currently DHHS is attempting to stay within these standards despite outdated network switches through a series of other electronic and even some manual security methods. In order to support a full digital records environment, DHHS network switches must be replaced with those that provide for security protocols at the "switch level".

Records Server

Electronic records and charts are comprised of information stored in a true database as well as scanned images – which are essentially indexed "pictures" of scanned documents. While the database material stores very efficiently, the scanned images, in comparison, occupy a large volume of space. This space and the software to index and retrieve records typically require a dedicated server.

Secure Web Access

The implementation of a secure web access system that provides for encrypted remote access of medical records effectively leverages the digital database to ensure that other health care providers outside the Municipality of Anchorage can gain access to those records, safely and securely. This enables evacuees to readily maintain continuity of health care services through other providers outside the impact area.

Portable Clinic Data Entry Devices

The most efficient method to continue to populate data records and to service clients via an electronic records system is for the provider to enter health care services at the point of service. This requires the use of simple portable devices that can interface with the primary clinic data system as well as the scanning and retrieval system.

Personnel Requirements

Initially the conversion from existing hard copy records to an electronic format requires additional personnel to handle that transition period. After conversion of the old records, these personnel are no longer required.

There is a spatial component to many health and environmental hazards that can impact health care. The incorporation of this spatial element into health care records requires the specialized services of individuals trained in Geographic Information Systems (GIS). Achieving an electronic medical record system has been a national priority for the last four years. Hard copy medical records are not readily portable, impossible to effectively backup, and easily destroyed in a natural disaster. Federal HIPAA law mandates contingency plans for disasters including backup, storage and recovery of medical records. A key lesson learned from hurricane Katrina was that those agencies and medical providers who had moved to electronic medical records (EMR) were able to quickly make the data available to other providers as clients moved out of the impact area, and were able to rapidly reestablish full services once the evacuation order was over. Not only are EMRs critical to disaster recovery, but are viewed as a means of controlling costs in the US healthcare system. Research think-tank Rand estimates that going to an all electronic record system would have the potential to save US\$77 billion annually on efficiency alone.

In 2004 President Bush outlined a plan to ensure that most Americans have electronic health records within 10 years. To achieve the 10-year goal, the President introduced a series of initiatives aimed at speeding up development and implementation of a national infrastructure for electronic medical records. The initiatives were designed to facilitate the coordination of public and private sector efforts to accelerate the broader adoption of health information technology.

This project will repair two miles of the existing Girdwood Trail located on the side of the Alyeska Highway from the Seward Highway to Crow Creek Road. The trail is in dire need of repair, with uneven pavement and cracks due to culverts heaving as well as a bridge needing decking repair. This trail is used as an alternative route for Girdwood residents, many of them children, who enjoy walking and bicycling from their homes to the Girdwood Town Center and the Alyeska resort. If the trail is not repaired, pedestrians may venture onto the Alyeska Highway, which is not as safe as a trail separated from traffic. This trail also connects to the existing Bird to Gird Highway Trail, which is a major recreation route for trail users from as far away as Anchorage. Consistent with FHWA's TCSP program goals, this project would integrate transportation, community and system preservation by improving the efficiency of transportation and reducing environmental impacts of transportation (diverting car traffic from roads to trails) and ensuring efficient access to jobs, services and centers of trade (trail links neighborhoods with the Girdwood Town Center and Alyeska resort).
